HOW TO USE DISCOVERING COLLECTION:

Go to the Discovering Collection URL with your Internet browser. At the home page, you will find several search options.

BASIC SEARCH BY POPULAR TOPIC

Click on a topic from the Popular Topics List for immediate results, without having to enter a search term or visit intermediary screens. This list is only available from Basic Search mode.

BASIC SEARCH BY SUBJECT, KEYWORD, OR ENTIRE DOCUMENT


To broaden or narrow your search in one step, three types of searches are available from Basic Search mode.

- SUBJECT SEARCH** – For common topics, enter your search term in the entry box, select the Subject radio button and then click “Search”. Subject search searches the subject terms that have been assigned to the documents in the database and is meant to yield very specific results.
- KEYWORD SEARCH** – For less common terms such as proper nouns, repeat process but select Keyword search. Keyword search searches the key fields of the documents in the database such as the title, introductory text, author, and subject terms.
- ENTIRE DOCUMENT SEARCH** – For jargon, new terminology or more abstract topics, repeat process but select Entire Document search to conduct the broadest search.
- You may further narrow your results by limiting to documents with images, by content level and content type.

SUBJECT GUIDE SEARCH


Search the Subject Guide when you want to browse a listing of subjects, people, products, locations and organizations that contain word or words you entered. From this listing (known as the Subject Guide), you can select a term and see a results list of citations, or navigate through the Subject Guide by selecting subdivision and related subjects links.

PUBLICATION SEARCH

Publication Search is best used when you would like to browse and view the contents of a specific publication.





ADVANCED SEARCH

Use Advanced Search for:

- Finding a specific article, when you already know the title, publication name or author
- Locating all articles by a specific author or journalist
- Retrieving all articles from a certain journal
- Combining your terms with Boolean operators and index fields
- Limiting your results by document type – Biography, Poem, Documents with Images, etc.
- And much more!


Enter the term(s) in an index field. Boolean operators, and, or and not let you connect up to ten terms or you may limit your search even further by selecting one or more of the search limiters provided.


VIEWING YOUR RESULTS

Once you execute a successful search, you will view a results list. Your results will be organized by content type such as: reference, creative works, primary sources, and multimedia. To view the contents underneath one of these tabs, click on the type of content you are interested in reviewing at the top of the search results list. Tabs with no results are "grayed out" and will not work. When you do a Basic Search, your results citations will include an excerpt showing the first occurrence of your search term as found within the text of the document, this feature is called Keyword in Context. Scan the list of titles to locate one to fit your research needs. To use your results list click on the hyperlinked text to read the document.



CURRICULUM STANDARDS SEARCH

Use the Curriculum Standards search if you are looking for content in the Discovering Collection database that correlates with National and/or State Educational curriculum standards. Choose Curriculum Standards from the database toolbar. Choose the set of standards you wish to view. Further narrow your search by selecting the specific subject area and grade level. Click a plus sign (+) to expand (show) sublevels or click a minus sign (-) to collapse (hide) a level. When a curriculum standard has been fully expanded, you'll find links to Related Subjects which will take you to content that supports the educational standard you are viewing as seen in the picture below.



TOPIC TREES SEARCH

Topic Trees searching allows you to search lists of popular topics by subject area without having to enter a search string. These subject areas are: Cultures, Geography, Literature, Science, US History, and World History. Topic Trees can be found in Basic Search mode underneath the Basic Search box, or by selecting Topic Trees from the database navigation bar.




TOOLS YOU CAN USE

BOOKMARKS

 By using the Bookmark feature, you and others can revisit practically any page you choose after you've ended your current session. The Bookmark feature is available for an individual article, search results, table of contents, saved article folder, etc. While viewing a page, simply click the Bookmark link in the grey banner. A separate window will open, allowing you to copy and paste the Bookmark into another document, web site or teaching tool, bookmark the URL into your favorites list and/or e-mail it.

READSPEAKER



An audio player appears below the title of each document. Listen to all, or part of a document, read aloud by a computer-generated voice. If you want to hear the audio version of the whole document, click the play button. Note that if you have any part of the document selected on the page, you will hear just that highlighted text. To see the read portion of the document highlighted and to change the speed of the audio, use the setting link. You can also download an audio version of the document as an MP3 file by selecting download.
